PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 28th September. All Councillors were present and apologies for absence were received from Mr Bobbin and from the Clerk.

The minutes of the Council, held on 31st August were signed as a true record.

Matters arising:~the Chairman is to ask the school if they wish to be involved in plans for the celebration of the Queen's Jubilee

Reports: There have been requests for "Drive Carefully" signs to be erected in Staple Street. Mr Chapman undertook to contact Kent Highways on the subject Landowners are to be reminded that hedges and verges should be trimmed. In parts of the Parish they are creating a hazard because they are impeding sight lines.

Concern was expressed about the proposed amendments to the ex-

isting planning regulations. The local MP is to be written to notifying him of Councillors' fears for the countryside.

Mr Morsman reported that he had repaired the rubbish bin at Staple Street He also reported that the footpath leading to Fostall is becoming difficult to walk due to earth spilling through a fence onto the path.

The Local Government Boundary Commission was discussed. It was considered that any such review should be kept as small and efficient as was possible.

The methods of printing the Hernhill News was finalised, following lengthy enquiries made by Mr Elliott, who, on a proposal made by Mrs Geliot, seconded by Mr Morsman, was thanked for his long and thorough work in research. On Mr Elliott's recommendation, the Parish Council is to register with Kent County Supplies, for stationery purchases and the like.

There seems to be among a few, confusion and misunderstanding about the purpose of the Restoration Fund.

The Restoration Fund is not a 'religious' organisation. It is not a camouflaged system for the fund-

ing of religious services. The money raised by the Fund is exclusively for the purpose of making the building structurally sound and functionally accessible to all. As a Grade 1 listed building, the work done on the building has to meet with the approval of English

Heritage and other authorities responsible for preservation.

The annual running costs of St. Michael's Church as a place of worship and as part of the Church of England exceed £30,000. THESE COSTS ARE NOT CONTRIBUTED TO BY THE RESTORATION FUND.

The Restoration Fund is separately managed and has separate accounts from those of St. Michael's Church.

If, like so many other churches in England, the building should cease to be used as a place of worship, its value to the community will re-

main. It has already been used for concerts, art exhibitions and flower festivals. In the future, more events of wide appeal will be encouraged.

Our 14th century pub and church on the village green are a picture-book example of a typical English village. At this time when the countryside is under threat as never before, we must strive to cherish and preserve our heritage for future generations. This is not just a local matter. This is a matter for all who care about our children and grandchildren. This is why the Fund needs the help of everyone, individuals and organisations alike.

FROM THE VICAR

As a child at Sunday School I sang, from the Scripture Union chorus book

‘The best book to read is the Bible,
The best book to read is the Bible,
If you read it every day,
It will help you on your way,
Oh, the best book to read
is the Bible.’

The Bible I owned, and read occasionally, was the Authorised or King James Bible (KJB), my edition had tiny print and a few pictures, not terribly appealing to a child, I had to wait until I was a teenager before there were modern language editions with attractive illustrations. Today I have at least fourteen different translations or paraphrases on my shelves, ranging from the

Street Bible and the Blokes Bible to Good News and the New Revised Standard Version with inclusive language. How things have changed since the 1960s, as well as paper versions we can also read the Bible on the Internet, as an app on our mobile phone or listen to it on CD. This year we are celebrating the 400th anniversary of the KJB Bible, the first English Bible to be available to ordinary people. For some people it is an opportunity to celebrate the impact that one book has had on our culture. Other people will reflect on the sacrifices made by those whose scholarship and courage produced an English Bible. The Bible is the world’s best seller but sadly it is perhaps the least read book on anyone’s shelf. Today we have the advantage of many Bible reading notes and commentaries

available to help us understand what we read and apply it to our everyday lives. I am always happy to recommend which version of the Bible may be best for you or which Bible reading notes may help you, it can be very bewildering with so many options on the market. There are also many different ways of reading the Bible which suit different personality types, again I am happy to advise.

If we read the Bible regularly it really will help us on our way, it is one of the ways by which we meet with God and can hear his living words to us. The object of reading the Bible is not just to deepen our understanding of God and his ways, but, more importantly, to deepen our relationship with God, and to equip ourselves with the resources we need to live as Christians in today's world.

On Sunday 2nd October at 10.00am there is Sung Communion, at St Michael's Hernhill to celebrate the patronal festival. Don't forget to wear a white rose. The guest preacher will be David Kemp (former diocesan secretary).

On Sunday 16th October at 10.00am it is Harvest Festival with Holy Communion. Please bring gifts for 'Catching Lives', a charity that works with the homeless in Canterbury.

On Tuesday 18th October at 7.30pm in St Michael's Church you are warmly invited to the service of thanksgiving for the restoration work so far completed and the ded-

BIBLE READING

2011 marks the 400th Anniversary of the King James' version of the Holy Bible.

To celebrate the Anniversary and to support its Restoration Appeal, St. Michael's Church Hernhill is organising a reading of the complete Bible over six days. The reading will take place from 9.00 a.m. to 9.00 p.m. each day commencing on the 7th November in half hour slots. The public is warmly invited to take part and to read for one or more of the "slots".

Although there had been a number of previous versions of the Bible, in 1604 King James VI (of Scotland) – in James I of England, commissioned a translation – persuaded by moderate puritans. The puritans, as we know, felt persecuted and left these shores to start a new life (in what is now America). They took the Bible with them but the new version was not published until 1611. Melvyn Bragg who has recently broadcast and indeed written a book on the Kings James' version, takes the view that it has had an indelible influence on language, art, architecture, slavery and the rights

of women worldwide. Its influence has been massive and indeed some argue that its influence worldwide on the English language has been greater than that of Shakespeare.

Andrew Motion, Poet Laureate from 1999 to 2009 states, "to read it is to feel simultaneously at home, a citizen of the world, and a traveller through eternity." And, "we have to recognise the power of this book, and in particular its power to fuse history with poetry, connects at the most fundamental level with our history and poetry."

And so this is a rare opportunity to take part in a celebration and only half an hour is needed if anybody wishes to take part.

Readers may be sponsored or make a contribution to the Restoration Fund but there is no obligation to do either.

The Restoration Committee is honoured that The Very Revd. Robert Willis, Dean of Canterbury Cathedral, hopes to commence the reading on the 7th November at 9.00 a.m.

BITS AND PIECES

Last month I missed reporting on someone who had lived in Dargate for some years. Violet Wood ,who

now lives in a care home in Whitstable, celebrated her 112th birthday. I understand that makes her the oldest person in the U.K. Many con-

gratulations. Earlier this month, another ex-Dargate resident, Buddy Mansfield, died. He was 86 years. He started his farming career with a 20 acre orchard in Dargate and over the years bought other farms in Kent. The firm of Mansfield and Son now has 3,500 acres.

I have just come back from camping in the Chichester area to find the garden parched. I didn't have the same kind of weather. Leaden skies and showers was more the rule on the South coast. It is interesting that the leaves there are already turning to yellows and reds, much ahead of the trees round here. Anyway, now that I am back the weather man is promising a hot dry spell. At least I can get the holiday washing dry.

You may be aware of the concern about the changes to the Planning Regulations. Many organisations have expressed their fears that the new regulations, which give priority to development, will lead to massive building schemes to the detriment of the countryside. If you want to know more about these concerns, the National Trust, the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England and the Daily Telegraph all have web-sites worth reading. This is really a major issue and now is the time for you to act. Having written to our MP stating my alarm at

the proposals, I have a letter from Hugh Robertson stating that he has already made known his concerns to the Minister. These regulations could have a considerable impact on our local countryside. Whatever conclusions you come to, for or against, it is worth making your views know to the Government. The closing date for the receipt of comments is Monday 17th October. It seems that we are to be moved. The Boundaries Commission has decided that in the interest of reducing the number of MPs, the various wards in our constituency are to be split up and shared round. If I have got it right, we are due to become part of Canterbury.

When the paper mill in Sittingbourne closed, one thing carried on. Their brass band continued to play. They still do, and you can enjoy hearing them here, in the church on Saturday 22nd October. They have a varied programme of light music which I am sure will suit all tastes. Come and enjoy the UK Paper Band. Book the date and for details keep an eye open for the posters on the notice boards.

While I think of it, the clocks go back on Sunday 30th October. You will get an extra hour in bed!
